Heart of the Matter

In the Gospels, the word we translate as "repentance" is *metanoia* and its basic meaning is "change of mind and heart". If we have a change of mind and heart this may lead us to fast or to pray more or to wear a horsehair shirt, but a possible effect of *metanoia* does not constitute its essential meaning. Lent is not essentially about 'giving up things' or engaging in painful occupations because we believe they are good for us or pleasing God. Lent is essentially about a change of mind and heart, about seeing reality differently, having a different attitude to everything. Lent embraces all that we encounter, a more demanding task than giving up sugar in our tea.

There is very little we can change in ourselves. The only effective change any of us can make is in the way we see things and in our attitude towards ourselves and others. Then everything begins to change for us because we are essentially related beings. Total independence is an illusion: total freedom for me alone or for my group alone is impossible. Lent is time for getting to the heart of the matter for all of us.

How can we prepare for this change? Lenten austerities can so fill our consciousness that we become a trial to ourselves, to those around us, and God becomes a trial to us. Could a better approach to Lent be to give ourselves at least a short period of quiet each day during which we reflect not on what we should give up or deny ourselves, but ask "What is it that I most desire out of life?" Try writing out the answers. We begin to see the impossibility of most of our desires, not because they are forbidden, but because they are incompatible, like the desire to be popular and always to be truthful. We can also discover the truth that destructive desires can only be effectively overcome, not by violent eradication, but by deeper desires.

Our basic desire is not something we create: it is something we slowly discover. It thrives on care and attention and draws us along with it. Charles Peguy has a poem called God's Dream. Its final stanza is:

*It is my dream you dream
My house you build-
My love you share
And this is the heart of the matter.*

First Reading: 2 Chronicles 36:14-16. 19-23

All the leading priests and the people were exceedingly unfaithful, following all the abominations of the nations; and they polluted the house of the Lord that he had consecrated in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, persistently sent his messengers to them, because he had compassion on his people and on his dwelling place; but they kept mocking the messengers of God, despising his words, and scoffing at his prophets, until the wrath of the Lord against his people became so great that there was no remedy. Therefore the Lord brought up against them the king of the Chaldeans, who burned the house of God, broke down the wall of Jerusalem, burned all its palaces with fire, and destroyed all its precious vessels. The king took into exile in Babylon those who had escaped from the sword, and they became servants to him and to his sons until the establishment of the kingdom of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord by the mouth of Jeremiah, until the land had made up for its sabbaths. All the days that it lay desolate it kept sabbath, to fulfil seventy years. In the first year of King Cyrus of Persia, in fulfilment of the word of the Lord spoken by Jeremiah, the Lord stirred up the spirit of King Cyrus of Persia so that he sent a herald throughout all his kingdom and also declared in a written edict: "Thus says King Cyrus of Persia: The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth, and he has charged me to build him a house at Jerusalem, which is in Judah. Whoever is among you of all his people, may the Lord his God be with him! Let him go up." The Word of the Lord.

Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. "And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God." The Gospel of the Lord.

Good Friday 3pm Service - would you like to be involved?

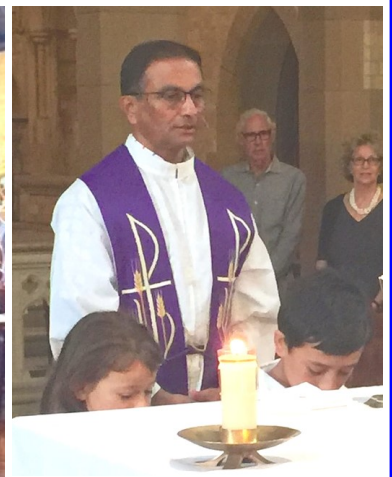

Congratulations Sisters of Charity: On Friday, 9th March, Archbishop Anthony Fisher presented to Sr Anthea Groves, Sr Jacinta Fong and Sr Sesarina Bau, the Papal Honour of Croce pro Ecclesia et Pontifice in recognition of the valuable contribution they have made to the Church's Health ministry at St Vincent's Hospital and in other healthcare institutions. This is the highest medal that can be awarded to laity by the Pope - in recognition for services done for the Church. These three Sisters have each made extraordinary contributions to St Vincent's Hospital at a time when the hospital has faced many changes, developments and challenges. They are not the first Sisters of Charity to receive this honour. In 1982, Sr Veronica Brady (in Toowoomba) and in 2003, Mother Marion Corless were also awarded this medal. Mother Marion was for some years Principal at St Vincent's College, Potts Point - and hence, was no stranger to St Canice's. We congratulate these former parishioners.
