First Sunday of Advent

Advent

"No one who waits for you is ever put to shame."

Entrance Antiphon, first Sunday of Advent

Advent means "The Coming". We remember God's historic coming in Jesus; we also pray to stay awake and on guard for his second Coming at the end of time. In the very early Church, this second Coming was thought imminent and most likely to happen on a Sunday at dawn, when Jesus rose from the dead. Consequently, Sunday liturgies began with an all night vigil on Saturday evening, so that the congregation would be awake and ready for the final Coming on Sunday. As we have now been waiting more than 2,000 years, the second Coming has lost something of its urgency. We are now in the gap between the first and the final Coming.

Time in itself, I learned in philosophy, does not exist. What, then, is eternity? We think of it as time stretching forwards and backwards without limit, a very boring prospect: but eternity does not stretch in that way.

Eternity is the now, the present moment; eternity, like God, is an eternal NOW. What an astonishing difference it makes to our lives when we think of eternity as an eternal NOW, and creation as a sacrament of the present moment.

The God who holds us now in being every second of our lives is the God who manifested Godself to us in Jesus 2,000 plus years ago. We are not living in an in between time between two Comings: we are living in the same NOW as we remember 2,000 years ago, and the second Coming will be in the same NOW. God is as near to us at this moment as God was present to Mary, 2,000 years ago. If this leaves your head spinning, let it spin; just hear God calling you by name and telling you "I am with you always, even till the end of time."

During Advent, it is good to keep reminding ourselves "God is come". If that jars grammatically, try "God has come and is now here, wherever and however I happen to be". "The Spirit, who lived in Jesus and raised him from the dead, now lives in me." Just keep listening to the phrase being spoken to you. Don't argue with it. Tell God your felt reactions; God who, in St Augustine's words, "is nearer to me than I am to myself".

In this way you are allowing yourself to meet God in God's continuous Coming and letting God be your teacher: "He who is your teacher will hide no longer, and you will see your teacher with your own eyes. Whether you turn to right or to left you will hear this voice behind you saying "This is the way, follow it" (Isaiah 30:21). And God is come not only to me, but is present in every single human being. The way we relate to one another is the way we meet God in his Coming.

I thank him that you have been enriched in so many ways, especially in your teachers and preachers; the witness to Christ has indeed been strong among you so that you will not be without any of the gifts of the Spirit while you are waiting for our Lord Jesus Christ to be revealed; and he will keep you steady and without blame until the last day, the day of our Lord Jesus Christ, because God by calling you has joined you to his Son, Jesus Christ; and God is faithful.

I set up the Inside Out Organic Soup Kitchen (IOOSK) at St Canice's four and a half years ago. The idea was to serve wholesome organic food to those who need it most on a Wednesday night. We believe that food is more than food. That food grown with respect and served with love is a great way to show worth to a person who doesn't believe they are worthy.

Our humble harvest of four zucchinis last week was a big moment for us. We're producing food, and that little part about 'food grown with respect' became a little brighter. I hope our garden inspires others to grow your own and pay greater respect to what's on your plate.

Yes, it was my dream to build the garden on the roof, but it would still be a dream without the amazing support we have had from all of our sponsors and supporters. In particular the team at PEPO BOTANIC DESIGN who have been working with me over the last 2 years to make this happen.

This week we had our first Volunteer Induction Briefing and launched the first issue of the Garden Guide Book. We now have a core group of 30 people who are ready to look after the garden and bring our programs to life. Next year is going to be big. We are in the process of setting up a Horticultural Therapy program with the St Vincent's hospital mental health team and our programs with the people seeking asylum will commence.
