

Faith is Relationships

Full Christian faith is not just saying 'Yes' to life. It is also saying 'Yes' to another person, Jesus. The capacity to say 'Yes' to other people and the capacity to say 'Yes' to Jesus are inseparable; both involve a commitment, a 'letting-go' to the other. Hence the quality of our relationships and the quality of our faith go hand in hand. If relationships figure prominently in our life, so will our relationship with Jesus. But if possessions, status symbols and achievements take precedence over relationships, then Jesus will be pushed to the edge of our life as a rather insipid and unappealing image. Further, since Christian faith is based on our relationship with Jesus, it is supernatural, which is a way of saying that the initiative comes from God. As Jesus tells us, 'No one can come to me, unless the Father draws them'...

In ordinary daily life, there is not much difficulty in encountering other people as living persons. But if we want to get to know them in any depth, the only way we can do this is by communicating with them – we have to talk and we have to listen. In terms of our relating with Jesus, the same truth applies. If we want him to come into our lives as a living person, we must take up a personal stance towards him: we must talk to him as a person, and we must listen. The difficulty is that Jesus does not answer back in the way other persons do. This is the difficulty of faith; but nevertheless, we have to do everything we can from our side.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 13: 4-13

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. Now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

Gospel Acclamation

Gospel: Luke 4: 21-30

Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up. He went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, as was his custom and read from the prophet Isaiah. The eyes of all were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" Jesus said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Doctor, cure yourself!' And you will say, 'Do here also in your hometown the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum.'" No prophet is accepted in the prophet's hometown. But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian." When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. They got up, drove Jesus out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But Jesus passed through the midst of them and went on his way.
