

'The Breaking of the Bread'

Luke tells how, on that same third day, two of the disciples were on their way to a town called Emmaus, a few miles out of Jerusalem, when they were joined by a man they did not recognize. While they walked, he talked with them about the whole sad story of the Messiah and how he had died. When evening came and they reached their destination, the stranger indicated that he was going to keep on a while longer, but they persuaded him to stop and have supper with them. It was only when he blessed the bread and then broke it and gave it to them that they saw who he was.

The table was laid with a turquoise cloth, and a big yellow fish had been brought in on a platter with its goggle eyes glazed in death. As soon as Jesus took the loaf of bread in his hands, one of the disciples leapt up from his chair and grabbed hold of the table to steady himself. The other remained sitting in a kind of a trance. They could hardly see the face of the stranger for the great sunflower of light that suddenly blossomed out behind it, but they saw enough to know that it was not a stranger who was standing there. The moment they knew who it was, he was gone.

First Reading: Acts 2:14.22-33

On the day of Pentecost, Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd, "People of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with deeds of power, wonders, and signs that God did through him among you, as you yourselves know—this man, handed over to you according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of those outside the law. "But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power. For David says concerning him, 'I saw the Lord always before me, for he is at my right hand so that I will not be shaken; therefore my heart was glad, and my tongue rejoiced; moreover my flesh will live in hope. For you will not abandon my soul to Hades, or let your Holy One experience corruption. You have made known to me the ways of life; you will make me full of gladness with your presence.'" The word of the Lord.

Second Reading: 1 Peter 1:17-21

If you invoke as Father the one who judges all people impartially according to their deeds, live in reverent fear during the time of your exile. You know that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without defect or blemish. Christ was destined before the foundation of the world, but was revealed at the end of the ages for your sake. Through him you have come to trust in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are set on God. The word of the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! Lord Jesus, make your word plain to us: make our hearts burn with love when you speak. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 24:13-35

On the first day of the week, two of the disciples were going to a village called Emmaus, about eleven kilometres from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And Jesus said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" Jesus asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that Jesus was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see Jesus." Then Jesus said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?" Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, Jesus interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures. As they came near the village to which they were going, Jesus walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So Jesus went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized Jesus; and he vanished from their sight. The two disciples said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. These were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" Then the two disciples told what had happened on the road, and how the Lord had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread. The Gospel of the Lord.

The Cardoner Project is excited to announce that we will be offering an Ignatian Camino through Northern Spain from August 30 – September 16, 2017. The Camino is a pilgrimage that is based upon the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius, and follows his footsteps from Loyola to Barcelona.



Our group will be limited to 10 people, with all pilgrims having access to a Jesuit spiritual director and the opportunity for daily Mass, examen and group reflection. The pilgrimage involves a maximum walking distance of 25km a day, however, there are components of the trip that involve bus transport in order to ensure we can cover the distances in a shorter period of time.

The Camino is for adults interested in exploring their faith, deepening their spirituality and enjoying some time for silence and personal reflection. Fr Josep sj of the Spanish province and Brother Ian Cribb sj of the Australian province will accompany and guide the pilgrimage.
