Feeling mercy changes everything....

***This is the best thing we can feel: it changes the world.
A little mercy makes the world less cold and more just.***

Pope Francis

In this fallen world the unity of human beings has been broken, everything is a “rat race”, and I try to free myself from the anguish that torments me by projecting it on another, the scapegoat of my tragic finiteness. The other person is always my enemy and I need him to be so. In Christ, however, death has been defeated, my inner hell transformed into the Church, I no longer need to have enemies, no one is separated from anyone. The criterion of the depth of one’s spiritual growth is therefore love for one’s enemies, in accordance with the paradoxical commandment of the Gospel that takes its meaning solely from the Cross - Christ’s Cross and ours - and from the Resurrection - again Christ’s and our own...

The true miracle, the most difficult achievement, is therefore the example and practice of love in the spiritual sense of that word (and here the Gospel speaks of *agape*, the Latin *caritas*). To enter into God is to let oneself be caught up in the immense movement of the love of the Trinity which reveals the other person to us as “neighbour” or (and this is better) which enables each one of us to become a neighbour of others. And to become a neighbour is to side with Christ, since he identifies himself with every human being who is suffering, or rejected, or imprisoned, or ignored.

When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' The lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. "But that same slave, as he went out, called upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. "When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. "So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart." The Gospel of the Lord.

PILGRIMAGE OF THE HEART - Caroline Coggins

St Ignatius had two powerful 'conversion' experiences. The first happened on his sick bed after a cannon ball smashed his leg in battle. Inigo was a man of noble blood, he was thirty, suddenly now his life as he imagined it was shattered. As he recovered (he would always have a limp) the course of his life changed, he decided that he wanted to follow Jesus, he wanted to become just like Saints Dominic and Francis. He set off with this desire.. to go to Jerusalem...but again he was stopped in his tracks.... He had a second 'conversion' at Manresa. He came to understand that he was unable to change things about himself ... It was not what he was going to do, but the unfolding of God working with him. Slowly he began to relinquish his will to God. This was the pilgrimage, from himself as centre to being with God.

During this time Ignatius began to jot down the notes that would become the *Spiritual Exercises*

I was accepted to go to Manresa in May this year for an Ignatian immersion course. It was a pilgrimage of heart for me, a wonderful rich adventure.

Some of you are curious what I was doing, and asked if I would give a talk.
