## 1st Sunday of Lent Year A

## Into the Desert

On this First Sunday of Lent we read the Gospel account of Jesus spending days in the desert at the beginning of his ministry. In a spiritual sense, we are invited to join him there through our Lenten practices.

Why the desert? Why penance? What value can a desert experience have for us? How will that prepare us for the celebration of Easter?

When we think of the desert we imagine sand, rocks, heat and perhaps the occasional circling buzzard, but there are more pervading experiences of the desert; quietness, discomfort, emptiness, centeredness. These desert experiences can help us to understand the benefit of prayer, fasting and generosity, and reveal to us how we can find joy in our Lenten penances.

For most of us, life is busy and noisy and we could be forgiven for wanting to leave it all behind from time to time - just to gain perspective. The quietness of prayer can achieve this, right where we are, by offering us an encounter with the love of God. It gives us an eternal perspective. When we make time for quiet prayer, we may find out anxieties, imperfections, hurts and challenges coming to the surface, but this is a good thing! In the quiet desert we have the space to take these things to Jesus and experience his compassion, forgiveness, healing and comfort.

Part of out Lenten tradition is fasting, the unleashing of our inner strength. Fasting helps free us from our addictions, illusions, prejudices, busyness and materialism. It helps clear away the inner clutter - voices, fears, wounds - strengthening our gratitude, increase our self-control and unite us with the suffering of the world.

### **Opening Prayer:**

Grant, almighty God, through the yearly observances of holy Lent, that we may grow in understanding of the riches hidden in Christ and by worthy conduct pursue their effects. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

### First Reading: Genesis 2:7-9. 3:1-7

The Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being. And the Lord God planted a garden in Eden, in the east; and there he put the man whom he had formed. Out of the ground the Lord God made to grow every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food, the tree of life also in the midst of the garden, and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves. The word of the Lord.

### Second Reading: Romans 5:12,17-19

Just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, so death spread to all, because all have sinned. If, because of the trespass of one, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one, Jesus Christ. Therefore just as the trespass of one led to the condemnation for all, so the act of righteousness of one leads to justification and life for all. For just as by the disobedience of one the many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one the many will be made righteous. The word of the Lord.

### Gospel: Matthew 6:24-34

After being baptized, Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." But he answered, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." Then the devil took him to the holy city and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down; for it is written, 'He will command his angels concerning you,' and 'On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." Jesus said to him, "Again it is written, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test." Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour; and he said to him, "All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me." Jesus said to him, "Away with you, Satan! for it is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him." Then the devil left him, and suddenly angels came and waited on him.
