500th Anniversary of the Reformation

In Wittenberg on 31 October 1517, Martin Luther posted ninety-five theses concerning abuses he saw in the church. The consequences of that action were no doubt unforeseen by him at the time, yet their effect has shaped the religious and cultural history of the west ever since. The date and the event have become symbolic of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. The anniversary of the Reformation in 2017 cannot go unnoticed. While it most directly touches Lutherans and Catholics, it is not without significance for other Christian communions, and indeed for western society. Five hundred years on, even though both the situation of the church and the world situation are very different from the time of Martin Luther, the effects of the Reformation endure.

By the grace of God there has been a fresh impetus towards unity during the last half century. The Second Vatican Council not only opened the way for Catholic participation in ecumenical dialogue, but also provided a pathway for renewal. Lutherans in Australia, as elsewhere in the world, responded positively to this opening for dialogue. Catholics and Lutherans have now been engaged internationally in theological dialogue for 50 years. The anniversary of the Reformation is an appropriate time to acknowledge the steps that have been taken to heal the wounds of the past five hundred years. The most important step was the signing of the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification by the Roman Catholic Church and the Lutheran World Federation in 1999.

Unity is the gift of God and the will of Christ for his Church (Cf. *Jn 17:21; 1 Cor 12:13*). Both the Lutheran Church of Australia and the Catholic Church acknowledge the unity we already share, and together we confess the one faith. We encourage all members of the Catholic Church and the Lutheran Church to hear from God a call to be continuously transformed by our encounter with each other and to be living witnesses to the power of the Gospel. (Cf. *Ac 1:8; Rom 1:16*)

with **Hugh Mackay** about belief

As a prelude to Christmas, you are invited to an interesting local community conversation on belief and belonging.

In *Beyond Belief*, one of Australia’s most insightful and influential social commentators, Hugh Mackay, argues that while our attachment to a traditional idea of God may be waning, our desire for a life of meaning remains as strong as ever. Hugh will outline the central themes of the book. This will be followed by a period of discussion between Fr Chris Jenkins SJ and Hugh, and then the conversation will open up to questions and contributions.

Parish Advent Retreat

We wait at advent, of course, but how are we waiting?

What a tender time it is when we wait, there can be many things in our hearts, anticipation, anxiety even, will they come? A new mother has many new and powerful feelings: will I be a good mother; will the child be born healthy; will I be able to support this child; what happens if...?

Advent is like this, we too are preparing for a birth.

This is often rushed over these days, so many other things to do, but deep in our hearts lives the desire, to know and welcome this presence.

We need time to prepare, to order our hearts, to make the space inside as we do for any relationship.

At the heart of St Ignatius’ (founder of the Society of Jesus) was discernment. He made a choice, to deepen his life and orientate his life to become a pilgrim. It was his discerning that allowed him to be shaped, but more, he came to understand how God was shaping him to serve.

We may feel the need to listen to God, to wait on God, but equally necessary is to place ourselves in a position to hear, to open our hearts and ready that nursery for the child that will be born and the ensuing and life changing relationship.

In the busiest time amongst family and friends do you, perhaps, also feel the need for silence, to make the time to notice how God might be preparing you for your spiritual birth?
