Just words!

May 26: Sorry Day May 27: National Reconciliation Week

National Reconciliation Week this year marks the 20th anniversary of Reconciliation Australia and its mission to find a right and just place for Indigenous Australians in our society. It occurs at a time of distress at the number of Indigenous Australians who have died in custody. As Reconciliation Australia notes in its review of the last 20 years, it also marks the growing number of ways in which non-Indigenous Australians have come to recognise the unique place of Indigenous peoples in our Australian story, and the further distance we must go if there is to be reconciliation.

The theme for 2021 is *More than just a word*. It points to the ever-present danger that words like *reconciliation* express large hopes and commitments but turn out to be no more than words. Such big words occur everywhere in documents and speeches, but rarely command what is needed: actions, policies or budgets. They are an art-form constantly drawn on to give an appearance of good will and commitment yet will later prove to be illusory.

Situations where one group of people has been discriminated against by another and where discrimination is written unnoticed into the workings of society, demand more than just a word. They demand *just* words. Reconciliation



must be embodied in actions, in change of heart, in changed public attitudes, and in the resolve to meet demanding challenges instead of denying or neglecting them. Reconciliation demands change.

The quite recent deaths of four Indigenous persons in prison underlines the urgency of reconciliation. Such deaths reflect the disproportionate incarceration of Australian Indigenous people, little changed for more than 30 years after a Royal Commission. That Royal Commission considered many facets of the life of Indigenous peoples that contributed to their imprisonment and death in prison. A good number of those can be traced to the dispossession of their ancestors and their subsequent treatment by the people who drove them off their lands, took away their children and scorned their culture. Their *reality* has been one of experiencing discrimination.

Reconciliation must be first made with reality. That involves recognising the human reality of the relationships between Indigenous people and those who supplanted them and knowing the history of those relationships. Recognising human reality, first requires our interest in the human beings involved.

The path towards reconciliation begins with curiosity and wonder at our Indigenous brothers and sisters, their vision of the world and what they value. Curiosity then leads us to interest in their stories. These inevitably take us back to the invasion by representatives of the European culture and its effects both on Indigenous culture and on the people who inherited it. We are led to recognise the racist attitudes, discriminatory laws, exploitation and abusive administration that have contributed to the social ills that have afflicted Indigenous people. These include their disproportionate ill health, ightharpoonup p.2

from p.1: unequal incarceration, and limited access to educational opportunity and work.

Like many Australians we at Jesuit Social Services have committed ourselves to the Indigenous Australians among those we serve, and to a path of discovery and solidarity leading to reconciliation. We know that we stand at the beginning of that path.

Though built on the shared recognition of these realities, reconciliation can only take place when Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians meet as equals and address the challenges that as a nation we face in building a *just* society. This will entail removing obstacles that attitudes and practices based on inequality have created; and supporting initiatives within Indigenous communities and institutional change that will lead to real reconciliation. Reconciliation will then be more than just a word.
